Minister's Report

Hello to each and every reader of this annual report. It certainly sets out a year of achievement for the church in its opening up of the building to the community, its final accounting for the new hall, using less of our precious resources than we had imagined would be possible. So in practical terms it has been another good year.

But it is on the non-practical elements that I want reflect with you. Every week we have been blessed to have public worship with dedicated preachers, supportive choir, and a thoughtful and sincere worshipping congregation. We have been blessed with some new friends and members, both in worship and in our weekly activities. We have shared some of our innermost thoughts and feelings at Prayer Group, Emmaus Group, Café Church, Reflective Meditation, the URC consultation and in other ways.

We are truly blessed to be a church where we are praying and acting in a way that can lead us to fulfil our Mission Statement. "Where people come to celebrate their faith in Jesus; where they are supported in their faith by sharing it with other disciples; where they find friendship, company and supportive activities for themselves and their families; where they are inspired for their own lives, and empowered to go out in mission and service to the community."

Every one of our members and friends has a place in this church, which is unique to them, and which brings joy and value to the community of disciples here. I recognize that we have lost several of our members this years, and we remember them all with fondness and gratitude. His humble faith and joy in his Lord is a sign that leads us on. Thank you Rex.

I hope that over the coming year we can build on that openness, welcome and service, and find new friends and help us and them to walk more nearly in the footsteps of our Lord. I would like also to think how we can look to the future in our care of our older members. How can this church minister to our older members, so that they are recognized, supported, included? How can we be enabled to feel that it is good to be part of a church which loves them and remembers them, even if they cannot be with us every Sunday?

And as we look into the future for ministry, knowing that the URC and Methodist Churches are facing a crisis caused by the aging of its ordained ministers, we need to start to think through how we can be a church where everyone is able to find a way to exercise a personal ministry among our members, friends and the community. We need to find a way to re-create the sense that the early church had of a community of disciples where everyone shared in the maintenance of the Christian fellowship. They found this a liberating experience: maybe we could too.

I look forward to starting the next three years of my time with you. It has been a joy and a privilege to serve you. Thank you. Ian Lucraft

Secretary's Report

This year (2018) will mark our 10th anniversary as an Local Ecumenical Partnership of United Reformed and Methodist Churches, and it is remarkable what we have achieved during the last ten years. Our society has grown in faith, compassion and confidence; our Church is more welcoming and is a refuge for those in need. It really underlines the power of the Holy Spirit working through us!

Last year my report was largely an update on the building progress (or lack of it!) so this year I'll concentrate more on Church activities. Central to these is our Sunday morning worship and I hope you all are aware by now that our Churches in Sheffield are desperately short of Ministers. So I want to start by thanking Pam for all her hard work in ensuring our plan was always full and lan and the Worship Group for their invaluable input. We are fortunate that Preachers want to come to Christ Church and share in our mission and we should be prepared to receive them and accept that they will provide a wide spectrum and variety of approaches. In September we received the good news that Ian would serve another three year term (starting this September) and would also be looking after Crane Moor and Green Moor. During the next two years we shall have to decide what we shall do after Ian — a real challenge.

Café Church and Emmaus have continued to enlighten our knowledge of the Bible and our roles in society. Ian will be leading Café Church on alternate months this year and will develop the theme of "Holy Habits." Film night has entertained us and left us thinking about aspects of our approaches to life and has been well supported. Reflective Meditation on a Sunday evening has been consistently supported by a few members and is planned to continue. Christ Church Guild, meeting in the autumn and spring has provided a midweek service and fellowship and also attracts visitors from outside.

During the year we agreed to be a "guinea pig" Church for a new initiative being tried by the URC and received Ian Lee supported by Simon Copley for a service of explanation and a Pea and Pie supper where we considered our Strengths, Opportunities, Aspirations and Resources - you may remember the acronym SOAR! We shall follow this up in 2018.

We are very grateful to Margaret Goldsborough who introduced a new "Musical Evening" on a Sunday which was very successful and has been repeated and more are planned this year. We also enjoyed another evening with the Salvation Army Citadel Band which Katie and Nev. planned, and of course Pearl's evening of music and song in the autumn. Fox Valley Voices have held concerts in the Community Hall which have been excellent. Thanks to all those involved.

The year was completed with our "Journey to Bethlehem" organised by Simon with a little bit of help from Ray which was a visual message (and an invitation to follow further) to all our visitors to the Community Hall. In addition to the Advent services the Guild sang carols at The Royd and we all enjoyed Christmas lunch at Cubley.

Having got to a finish point with the Community Hall we have held some wonderful fun events both in the Church and the community. The year started with our annual trip to the Crucible and enjoyed "Annie get your Gun" organised by Katie and Nev. In February we repeated the "humungous book sale" and although I got rid of several books I acquired some classic car books!

March brought a welcome return of the Bus Pass Buskers, enjoyed with a pea and pie supper wonderful. In April we joined with the WI to entertain spectators to watch the Tour de Yorkshire on the big screen in the Community Hall and provide all manner of refreshments. Fortunately we covered our costs and raised over £100 towards a defibrillator. In the summer "enthusiasts" enjoyed a car rally round West Yorkshire, the treasure hunt being won by Robin's crew! It was all aboard in the autumn for Simons cruise in the Community Hall, a very enjoyable evening packed with games and laughter. A year of good fellowship, fun and laughter!

The Community Hall is proving a big success with the community. The hall is being used every day of the week and is proving an embarrassment when our own members want to use it for family celebrations or indeed a section of the Church needs it. Jenny is doing a wonderful job in controlling the bookings but please make sure you check with her before assuming a date is free; we have a book at home as well as the one in Church! You can see all the activities listed in Appendix 3.

Being a large family there are times of joy and times of sorrow. It was wonderful to share in the baptisms of four young children through the year. Molly Wilkinson, Charlotte and Georgia England-Woodcock and Clay Taylor were all baptised.

Margaret and Philip Lindquist were married in March, and John and Natalie Priestly (Frank's and Jenny's niece) were married in September.

It was with great joy we welcomed nine new members into our fellowship!

Our times of sorrow ran through the year as we said farewell to eight of our members and adherents. The six members were:- Dorothy Utting, Agnes Grindle, Rex Brearley, Mark Rotchell, Mary Kaye and David Hampshire. We can remember them all with love and fond memories. They have all played their part in the life of our Church and indeed in our own lives and we all have different joys we shared with them and they will all be remembered for what they did to get us to where we are now. May they all rest in God's peace.

Mark was our organist and following his untimely death John Cornell, Margaret Goldsborough and Frank Hardman liaised together to plan cover for the Church music, particularly for our worship, and we have (yet again) been blessed with talented individuals who have ensured continuity-and we're very grateful to them.

Finally I need to share with you the fact that Church life is becoming far more bureaucratic than it used to be. In addition to having all our procedures in place and up to date and regularly reviewed and updated, we have to update our safeguarding arrangements and training. We shall shortly be appointing a Data Protection Officer and asking all members' permission to use/share their names addresses and 'phone numbers. We now have to supply returns to the Synod office every six months with details of all our tenants and their behaviour in the Community Hall!

Food Bank Report

Ray and Ronnie Hawley continue as Team Leaders of the food bank along with 9 volunteers, of which five belong to Christ Church.

2017 was a busy year seeing an increase in the amount of people using it. We find more people are becoming aware that we are around and we are getting referrals from agencies out of the area.

For 2017 we had a total of 174 visits this is broken down into

470 souls, of which 298 were adults and 172 children. Plus a few dogs and cats!

So far in 2018 - January to March we have fed 84 adults and 50 children.

We have been asked by several institutions to give talks about the food bank, what we do and how we do it. We find by the end of our talk people are quite humbled and sometimes shocked to hear so many people in the Valley and surrounding areas need to visit a food bank.

We rely solely on donations from the general public and without these we would not be able to function.

Christ Church in particular continues to be one of our faithful donors and whatever we ask for we usually find it in the box the following week.

Meeting Place, (Social Café) Report

The Meeting Place is a 'social café' - a friendly place where people from the Stocksbridge area who need companionship can meet and enjoy time together, have a coffee and a bit of breakfast or lunch, have a go at a new activity, or just sit and read the newspaper in the company of others. The Meeting Place also provides support and advice for accessing local services and information about local community groups and activities. The support is provided by a team of volunteers and the Social Café Coordinator.

A key aim of this project is for individuals in need of support to be referred to the social café, and in turn for the social café to help signpost individuals to relevant services and local support so that a minor difficulty can be prevented from becoming a crisis.

Since opening its doors in October 2016, we have had 47 referrals. We have grown from initially being a small group with a handful of members to a busy group of 26 or more regularly attending members. We have recruited 5 volunteers since opening the Social Cafe, in addition to the original 10 volunteers who have been with us from the start.

We have also become a volunteer post for the Credit Union and been instrumental in helping an alcohol / dependency group start recently, under the auspices of the Sheffield Alcohol Services.

As well as our usual activities we now have a chairobics monthly session. We have also had meditation/mindfulness sessions, music lessons from a ukulele band, visits from local groups and organizations, and group outings to Langsett Reservoir, Yorkshire Sculpture Park and Penistone Paramount Cinema.

We serve a range of cafe-style food and drink throughout the session, and have a popular arts and crafts table as well as other activities such as jigsaws, board games, cards and dominoes,

puzzle books, newspapers and magazines. We also have a table tennis table and use of a Scalectrix. Ethel's therapeutic hand massage is very well used and appreciated.

Given that this has been our first full year we are very pleased with our progress. However, we are not complacent and are looking to develop further activities and further contacts and opportunities.

We would like to thank all our volunteers for their commitment and care and dedication. We will finish with a quote from one of our members:

"It's good therapy coming here ... it's good being around other people",

Busy Little Hands

Busy Little Hands Baby and Toddler Group continues to be a great success and has now entered its fourth year and is as popular as ever.

We are very excited about the work that has been done to create a safe outdoor play area. The children are looking forward to using the new play house and having the opportunity to participate in more messy play activities outside which will include seed planting, sand and water!

The format of the sessions continues to work well. The toys, books and activity frames are set out the day before (whenever possible) so that when the children arrive they can begin to play immediately. It is wonderful to see the children interacting in the general play session which starts at 9:45 am. During this time the children are able to play freely with one another, access the craft table where they can make up small craft items and colour and draw. We also provide an area where grownups can read with their child. The children are also welcome to take books home to read.

Around 10:30 a snack is served in the entrance lobby. Individual plates of food are served at small tables and the children all sit down and eat together. Grownups also have the opportunity to have a hot drink and a biscuit.

After refreshments the children can participate in some more general play before taking part in a singing session. Each child gets to choose a song in turn. More often than not the singing ends with the popular choice of the "hokey cokey"!

Our Christmas party was a great success with the children all enjoying a visit from a very special guest in a red suit! Each child received a reading book paid for from the weekly subscriptions.

Many of the children from the playgroup also took part in the Nativity service and even a couple of dads joined in!

We have just had our last session before the Easter break and the children and their own Easter basket and decorated it. Each child was then able to greet the Easter bunny and receive chocolate eggs for their basket.

We are pleased to report that with good budgeting we have been able to keep the weekly subscription to just £1.50 which means the group is accessible to all socioeconomic backgrounds.

Again we would like to stress how grateful we are for all the help from the volunteers who help in moving toys, preparing and serving the food and cleaning up at the end of the sessions and of course to the Church for the use of the premises.

Wendy Law, the MHA Manager visits and assesses all prospective members and supervises the activities each week and occasionally invites outside entertainers to ensure a very varied and enjoyable experience to all our members.

We are very grateful to all the volunteers, cooks, servers, bus drivers and escorts without whose enthusiastic dedication the Club would not function. Thanks also to Wendy for all her hard work to keep the Club viable and growing.

Property Report

We are pleased to be able to confirm that the new hall has now been paid for and is fully ours. The builder will have no further involvement with the building. Taking on the new hall has extended the number of visits from contractors to service the number of additional items that need an annual service. For example, the lift, fire alarm and building alarm systems. Many more visits need looking after, and after some careful thought we now have David Thomas providing "Building Support". David comes to the Church every morning to check that the building is running smoothly and carries out small maintenance tasks, which very often would go unnoticed. It is most useful having someone to do these small items, and you are encouraged to see David if you find anything not as it should be.

Sitting in the Church you may have noticed that some of the walls have damp patches showing, and giving rise to the paint peeling. During the winter we have had new gutters and downpipes fitted to prevent water overflowing from the gutter system. We have taken professional advice on the water ingress and are currently in discussion with a contractor about having all the coping stones removed, the tops of the walls waterproofed and the coping stones refitted and secured to prevent water ingress. This will be an expensive exercise and will involve the erection of scaffolding around parts of the building. When the refitting of the coping stones has been completed and proved to be satisfactory it is the intention to carry out redecoration work in the Church area. Inevitably this will cause disruption to the activities of worship.

We also have on order a purpose made shed for the storage of material that had been stored in the building container next to the road. The new shed will be in a similar position next to the road, and work will commence shortly.

Storage of materials for the many groups now using the Church has become a problem, so some shelving has been put up in the storage area of the new hall to help with this.

The pile of stones remain in the car park. Work is in hand for the Steel Valley Project to use the stone to build a wall adjacent to the new hall, possibly incorporating an archway.

We are also looking to provide a garden area adjacent to the hall, to be used by the Monday Social Cafe.

We have also had installed a new audio system for the Church, which has perhaps not been noticed by everyone. More recent work to the system has included an extension to allow the vision to be seen and the sound to be heard in the hall, should this be required.

My thanks to those who have worked hard to keep the new building and the existing Church in a good and presentable condition.

Treasurers Report

It's gratifying once again to be able to report the overall finances of Christ Church remain strong and we are able to pay our way and increase our Mission in the community. The reported figures are still distorted by the effects of the building funds in 2016 and the bequest from Trevor Walley.

The total receipts from offerings were down from 2016 due to the late application for gift aid which will be paid in 2018. The income from lettings was down due to the manse being vacated for over a month earlier in the year and the higher cost of repairs in expenditure was due to a total internal manse redecoration and replacing two old carpets and changing the oven and dishwasher in the kitchen – amounting to a total of £4564. Also included in this category is capital spend on the new amplification system in Church and the new hymn books. The Church is very grateful for the anonymous donations from members which allowed for this purchase!

The miscellaneous figures have increased both in income and expenditure and reflect the increasing complexity of our activities (and finances!) and include our coverage of the "Tour de Yorkshire" and running the Social Café; the latter will have their own account in 2018.

In December the final payment for the community hall was completed — after protracted negotiations lead by our Quantity Surveyor who was able to save us many tens of thousands of pounds! The final architect's fees were also paid and the account has a balance of £46.9k. You can see the draft statement being prepared for all the income and expenditure at Appendix 4. This gives a more easy-to-see picture of where the money has come from and how it has been used.

This is required to put towards the cost of replacing all the coping stones on all the gables and then the complete redecoration of the Church and Lecture Hall. There is also the Quinquennial Inspection as well as completing the boundary wall adjacent to the north face of the new hall.

In 2018 we shall be establishing the next 5 year budget to ensure we have a plan to cover the cost of developing our future mission in the community and also prioritise further work on all our facilities to match the developments.

Ann and Mike are grateful for all the help, advice and support they have received during the year and also to Jenny who has managed the Development account and Mavis who has continued her oversight of the Trustees account.
